**A BILL**

Making appropriations for the Legislative Branch for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2014, and for other purposes.

1       *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*  
2       *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

1 That the following sums are appropriated, out of any  
2 money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated, for the  
3 Legislative Branch for the fiscal year ending September  
4 30, 2014, and for other purposes, namely:

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

9

SALARIES AND EXPENSES

10 For salaries and expenses of the House of Represent-  
11 atives, \$1,171,569,576, as follows:

12

HOUSE LEADERSHIP OFFICES

13 For salaries and expenses, as authorized by law,  
14 \$22,058,308, including: Office of the Speaker,  
15 \$6,579,621, including \$25,000 for official expenses of the  
16 Speaker; Office of the Majority Floor Leader, \$2,158,463,  
17 including \$10,000 for official expenses of the Majority  
18 Leader; Office of the Minority Floor Leader, \$7,044,031,  
19 including \$10,000 for official expenses of the Minority  
20 Leader; Office of the Majority Whip, including the Chief  
21 Deputy Majority Whip, \$1,867,952, including \$5,000 for  
22 official expenses of the Majority Whip; Office of the Mi-  
23 nority Whip, including the Chief Deputy Minority Whip,

7 For Members' representational allowances, including  
8 Members' clerk hire, official expenses, and official mail,  
9 \$543,918,813.

10 COMMITTEE EMPLOYEES

11 STANDING COMMITTEES, SPECIAL AND SELECT

12 For salaries and expenses of standing committees,  
13 special and select, authorized by House resolutions,  
14 \$119,376,151: *Provided*, That such amount shall remain  
15 available for such salaries and expenses until December  
16 31, 2014.

17 COMMITTEE ON APPROPRIATIONS

18 For salaries and expenses of the Committee on Ap-  
19 propriations, \$25,271,004, including studies and examina-  
20 tions of executive agencies and temporary personal serv-  
21 ices for such committee, to be expended in accordance with  
22 section 202(b) of the Legislative Reorganization Act of  
23 1946 and to be available for reimbursement to agencies  
24 for services performed: *Provided*, That such amount shall

1 remain available for such salaries and expenses until De-  
2 cember 31, 2014.

3 SALARIES, OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES

4 For compensation and expenses of officers and em-  
5 ployees, as authorized by law, \$173,721,185, including:  
6 for salaries and expenses of the Office of the Clerk, includ-  
7 ing the positions of the Chaplain and the Historian, in-  
8 cluding not more than \$25,000, of which not more than  
9 \$20,000 is for the Family Room and not more than  
10 \$2,000 is for the Office of the Chaplain, for official rep-  
11 resentation and reception expenses, \$24,009,473; for sala-  
12 ries and expenses of the Office of the Sergeant at Arms,  
13 including the position of Superintendent of Garages and  
14 the Office of Emergency Management, and including not  
15 more than \$3,000 for official representation and reception  
16 expenses, \$11,926,729, of which \$4,212,500 shall remain  
17 available until expended; for salaries and expenses of the  
18 Office of the Chief Administrative Officer including not  
19 more than \$3,000 for official representation and reception  
20 expenses, \$116,002,451, of which \$9,100,000 shall remain  
21 available until expended; for salaries and expenses of the  
22 Office of the Inspector General, \$4,741,809; for salaries  
23 and expenses of the Office of General Counsel,  
24 \$1,340,987; for salaries and expenses of the Office of the  
25 Parliamentarian, including the Parliamentarian, \$2,000



ities to heirs of deceased employees of the House,

ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISIONS

SEC. 101. (a) REQUIRING AMOUNTS REMAINING IN MEMBERS' REPRESENTATIONAL ALLOWANCES TO BE USED FOR DEFICIT REDUCTION OR TO REDUCE THE FEDERAL DEBT.—Notwithstanding any other provision of law, any amounts appropriated under this Act for “HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES—Salaries and Expenses—Members' Representational Allowances” shall be available only for fiscal year 2014. Any amount remaining after all payments are made under such allowances for fiscal year 2014 shall be deposited in the Treasury and used for deficit reduction (or, if there is no Federal budget deficit after all such payments have been made, for reducing the Federal debt, in such manner as the Secretary of the Treasury considers appropriate).

(b) REGULATIONS.—The Committee on House Administration of the House of Representatives shall have authority to prescribe regulations to carry out this section.

(c) DEFINITION.—As used in this section, the term “Member of the House of Representatives” means a Representative in, or a Delegate or Resident Commissioner to, the Congress.

2           For salaries and expenses of the Joint Economic  
3 Committee, \$3,983,158, to be disbursed by the Secretary  
4 of the Senate.

5                   JOINT COMMITTEE ON TAXATION

6           For salaries and expenses of the Joint Committee on  
7 Taxation, \$9,480,731, to be disbursed by the Chief Ad-  
8 ministrative Officer of the House of Representatives.

9           For other joint items, as follows:

10                   OFFICE OF THE ATTENDING PHYSICIAN

11           For medical supplies, equipment, and contingent ex-  
12 penses of the emergency rooms, and for the Attending  
13 Physician and his assistants, including: (1) an allowance  
14 of \$2,175 per month to the Attending Physician; (2) an  
15 allowance of \$1,300 per month to the Senior Medical Offi-  
16 cer; (3) an allowance of \$725 per month each to three  
17 medical officers while on duty in the Office of the Attend-  
18 ing Physician; (4) an allowance of \$725 per month to 2  
19 assistants and \$580 per month each not to exceed 11 as-  
20 sistants on the basis heretofore provided for such assist-  
21 ants; and (5) \$2,625,000 for reimbursement to the De-  
22 partment of the Navy for expenses incurred for staff and  
23 equipment assigned to the Office of the Attending Physi-  
24 cian, which shall be advanced and credited to the applica-  
25 ble appropriation or appropriations from which such sala-



1 ries, allowances, and other expenses are payable and shall  
2 be available for all the purposes thereof, \$3,222,160, to  
3 be disbursed by the Chief Administrative Officer of the  
4 House of Representatives.

5 OFFICE OF CONGRESSIONAL ACCESSIBILITY SERVICES  
6 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

7 For salaries and expenses of the Office of Congres-  
8 sional Accessibility Services, \$1,291,707, to be disbursed  
9 by the Secretary of the Senate.

10 CAPITOL POLICE

11 SALARIES

12 For salaries of employees of the Capitol Police, in-  
13 cluding overtime, hazardous duty pay, and Government  
14 contributions for health, retirement, social security, pro-  
15 fessional liability insurance, and other applicable employee  
16 benefits, \$274,511,000.

17 GENERAL EXPENSES

18 For necessary expenses of the Capitol Police, includ-  
19 ing motor vehicles, communications and other equipment,  
20 security equipment and installation, uniforms, weapons,  
21 supplies, materials, training, medical services, forensic  
22 services, stenographic services, personal and professional  
23 services, the employee assistance program, the awards pro-  
24 gram, postage, communication services, travel advances,  
25 relocation of instructor and liaison personnel for the Fed-

1 eral Law Enforcement Training Center, and not more  
2 than \$5,000 to be expended on the certification of the  
3 Chief of the Capitol Police in connection with official rep-  
4 resentation and reception expenses, \$55,190,000, to be  
5 disbursed by the Chief of the Capitol Police or his des-  
6 ignee: *Provided*, That, notwithstanding any other provi-  
7 sion of law, the cost of basic training for the Capitol Police  
8 at the Federal Law Enforcement Training Center for fis-  
9 cal year 2014 shall be paid by the Secretary of Homeland  
10 Security from funds available to the Department of Home-  
11 land Security.

12 ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISIONS

13 (INCLUDING TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

14 AUTHORITY TO TRANSFER AMOUNTS BETWEEN SALARIES

15 AND GENERAL EXPENSES

16 SEC. 1001. During fiscal year 2014 and any suc-  
17 ceeding fiscal year, the Capitol Police may transfer  
18 amounts appropriated for the fiscal year between the cat-  
19 egory for salaries and the category for general expenses,  
20 upon the approval of the Committees on Appropriations  
21 of the House of Representatives and Senate.

22 FUNDS AVAILABLE FOR WORKERS COMPENSATION

23 PAYMENTS

24 SEC. 1002. (a) IN GENERAL.—Available balances of  
25 expired United States Capitol Police appropriations shall

1 be available to the Capitol Police to make the deposit to  
2 the credit of the Employees' Compensation Fund required  
3 by section 8147(b) of title 5, United States Code.

4 (b) CONFORMING AMENDMENT.—Section 1018 of the  
5 Legislative Branch Appropriations Act, 2003 (2 U.S.C.  
6 1907) is amended by striking subsection (f).

7 (c) EFFECTIVE DATE.—This section shall apply with  
8 respect to appropriations for fiscal year 2014 and each  
9 fiscal year thereafter.

## 10 OFFICE OF COMPLIANCE

### 11 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

12 For salaries and expenses of the Office of Compli-  
13 ance, as authorized by section 305 of the Congressional  
14 Accountability Act of 1995 (2 U.S.C. 1385), \$3,617,348,  
15 of which \$780,000 shall remain available until September  
16 30, 2015: *Provided*, That not more than \$500 may be ex-  
17 pended on the certification of the Executive Director of  
18 the Office of Compliance in connection with official rep-  
19 resentation and reception expenses.

### 20 ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISIONS

21 SEC. 1101. (a) The second sentence of section 415(a)  
22 of the Congressional Accountability Act of 1995 (2 U.S.C.  
23 1415(a)) is amended to read as follows: “There are appro-  
24 priated for such account such sums as may be necessary  
25 to pay such awards and settlements.”.

1 (b) The amendment made by subsection (a) shall  
2 apply with respect to fiscal year 2014 and each succeeding  
3 fiscal year.

4 SEMIANNUAL REPORT OF DISBURSEMENTS

5 SEC. 1102. (a) REPORTS REQUIRED.—Not later than  
6 60 days after the last day of each semiannual period of  
7 a fiscal year, the Executive Director of the Office of Com-  
8 pliance shall submit to the Committee on House Adminis-  
9 tration of the House of Representatives, the Committee  
10 on Rules and Administration of the Senate, and the Com-  
11 mittees on Appropriations of the House of Representatives  
12 and Senate, with respect to that period, a detailed,  
13 itemized report of the disbursements for the operations of  
14 the Office of Compliance.

15 (b) CONTENTS.—The report required by subsection  
16 (a) shall include—

17 (1) the identification of any employee or con-  
18 tractor who receives a payment from the Office of  
19 Compliance;

20 (2) the quantity and price of any item furnished  
21 to the Office of Compliance;

22 (3) a description of any service rendered to the  
23 Office of Compliance, together with a statement of  
24 the time required for the service, and the name,  
25 title, and amount paid to each person who renders  
26 the service;

1 (4) a statement of all amounts appropriated to,  
2 or received or expended by, the Office of Compliance  
3 and any unexpended balances of such amounts; and

4 (5) such additional information as may be re-  
5 quired by regulation of the Committee on House Ad-  
6 ministration of the House of Representatives, the  
7 Committee on Rules and Administration of the Sen-  
8 ate, or the Committees on Appropriations of the  
9 House of Representatives or Senate.

10 (c) EFFECTIVE DATE.—

11 (1) IN GENERAL.—This section shall apply with  
12 respect to the semiannual periods of October 1  
13 through March 31 and April 1 through September  
14 30 of each fiscal year, beginning with fiscal year  
15 2013.

16 (2) SPECIAL RULE FOR REPORTS FOR FISCAL  
17 YEAR 2013.—The Executive Director of the Office of  
18 Compliance shall submit the reports required for the  
19 two semiannual periods of fiscal year 2013 not later  
20 than 120 days after the date of the enactment of  
21 this Act.

## 22 CONGRESSIONAL BUDGET OFFICE

### 23 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

24 For salaries and expenses necessary for operation of  
25 the Congressional Budget Office, including not more than

1 \$6,000 to be expended on the certification of the Director  
2 of the Congressional Budget Office in connection with offi-  
3 cial representation and reception expenses, \$41,496,677.

4 ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISION

5 ACCEPTANCE OF VOLUNTARY STUDENT SERVICES

6 SEC. 1201. (a) Section 3111(e) of title 5, United  
7 States Code, is amended—

8 (1) by striking “(e)” and inserting “(e)(1)”;  
9 and

10 (2) by adding at the end the following new  
11 paragraph:

12 “(2) In this section, the term ‘agency’ includes the  
13 Congressional Budget Office, except that in the case of  
14 the Congressional Budget Office—

15 “(A) any student who provides voluntary service  
16 in accordance with this section shall be considered  
17 an employee of the Congressional Budget Office for  
18 purposes of section 203 of the Congressional Budget  
19 Act of 1974 (relating to the level of confidentiality  
20 of budget data); and

21 “(B) the authority granted to the Office of Per-  
22 sonnel Management under this section shall be exer-  
23 cised by the Director of the Congressional Budget  
24 Office.”.

1 (b) The amendment made by subsection (a) shall  
2 apply with respect to fiscal year 2014 and each succeeding  
3 fiscal year.

#### 4 ARCHITECT OF THE CAPITOL

##### 5 GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

6 For salaries for the Architect of the Capitol, and  
7 other personal services, at rates of pay provided by law;  
8 for surveys and studies in connection with activities under  
9 the care of the Architect of the Capitol; for all necessary  
10 expenses for the general and administrative support of the  
11 operations under the Architect of the Capitol including the  
12 Botanic Garden; electrical substations of the Capitol, Sen-  
13 ate and House office buildings, and other facilities under  
14 the jurisdiction of the Architect of the Capitol; including  
15 furnishings and office equipment; including not more than  
16 \$5,000 for official reception and representation expenses,  
17 to be expended as the Architect of the Capitol may ap-  
18 prove; for purchase or exchange, maintenance, and oper-  
19 ation of a passenger motor vehicle, \$85,286,000.

##### 20 CAPITOL BUILDING

21 For all necessary expenses for the maintenance, care  
22 and operation of the Capitol, \$60,421,000, of which  
23 \$20,702,000 shall remain available until September 30,  
24 2018, and of which \$15,940,000 shall remain available





1 Printing Office and Washington City Post Office, and  
2 heating and chilled water for air conditioning for the Su-  
3 preme Court Building, the Union Station complex, the  
4 Thurgood Marshall Federal Judiciary Building and the  
5 Folger Shakespeare Library, expenses for which shall be  
6 advanced or reimbursed upon request of the Architect of  
7 the Capitol and amounts so received shall be deposited  
8 into the Treasury to the credit of this appropriation,  
9 \$109,334,000, of which \$37,200,000 shall remain avail-  
10 able until September 30, 2018: *Provided*, That not more  
11 than \$9,000,000 of the funds credited or to be reimbursed  
12 to this appropriation as herein provided shall be available  
13 for obligation during fiscal year 2014.

14 LIBRARY BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

15 For all necessary expenses for the mechanical and  
16 structural maintenance, care and operation of the Library  
17 buildings and grounds, \$47,861,000, of which  
18 \$23,448,000 shall remain available until September 30,  
19 2018.

20 CAPITOL POLICE BUILDINGS, GROUNDS, AND SECURITY

21 For all necessary expenses for the maintenance, care  
22 and operation of buildings, grounds and security enhance-  
23 ments of the United States Capitol Police, wherever lo-  
24 cated, the Alternate Computer Facility, and AOC security

1 operations, \$18,898,000, of which \$1,000,000 shall re-  
2 main available until September 30, 2018.

3 BOTANIC GARDEN

4 For all necessary expenses for the maintenance, care  
5 and operation of the Botanic Garden and the nurseries,  
6 buildings, grounds, and collections; and purchase and ex-  
7 change, maintenance, repair, and operation of a passenger  
8 motor vehicle; all under the direction of the Joint Com-  
9 mittee on the Library, \$11,372,000: *Provided*, That of the  
10 amount made available under this heading, the Architect  
11 of the Capitol may obligate and expend such sums as may  
12 be necessary for the maintenance, care and operation of  
13 the National Garden established under section 307E of  
14 the Legislative Branch Appropriations Act, 1989 (2  
15 U.S.C. 2146), upon vouchers approved by the Architect  
16 of the Capitol or a duly authorized designee.

17 CAPITOL VISITOR CENTER

18 For all necessary expenses for the operation of the  
19 Capitol Visitor Center, \$20,163,000.

20 ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISIONS

21 SEMIANNUAL REPORT OF DISBURSEMENTS

22 SEC. 1301. (a) REPORTS REQUIRED.—Not later than  
23 60 days after the last day of each semiannual period, the  
24 Architect of the Capitol shall submit to Congress, with re-  
25 spect to that period, a detailed, itemized report of the dis-

1 bursements for the operations of the Office of the Archi-  
2 tect of the Capitol.

3 (b) CONTENTS.—The report required by subsection  
4 (a) shall include—

5 (1) the name of each person who receives a pay-  
6 ment from the Office of the Architect of the Capitol;

7 (2) the quantity and price of any item furnished  
8 to the Office of the Architect of the Capitol;

9 (3) a description of any service rendered to the  
10 Office of the Architect of the Capitol, together with  
11 a statement of the time required for the service, and  
12 the name, title, and amount paid to each person who  
13 renders the service;

14 (4) a statement of all amounts appropriated to,  
15 or received or expended by, the Office of the Archi-  
16 tect of the Capitol and any unexpended balances of  
17 such amounts;

18 (5) the information submitted to the Comp-  
19 troller General under section 3523(b) of title 31,  
20 United States Code; and

21 (6) such additional information as may be re-  
22 quired by regulation of the Committee on House Ad-  
23 ministration of the House of Representatives or the  
24 Committee on Rules and Administration of the Sen-  
25 ate.

1 (c) PRINTING.—Each report under this section shall  
2 be printed as a House document.

3 (d) EFFECTIVE DATE.—This section shall apply with  
4 respect to the semiannual periods of January 1 through  
5 June 30 and July 1 through December 31 of each year,  
6 beginning with the semiannual period in which this section  
7 is enacted.

8 USE OF BUILDING

9 SEC. 1302. (a) USE OF BUILDING.—In exercising its  
10 authority under the item “Architect of the Capitol, Capitol  
11 Buildings and Grounds, House Office Buildings” in the  
12 Legislative Branch Appropriations Act, 1985 (Public Law  
13 98–367; 2 U.S.C. 2001 note), to use the building referred  
14 to in such item for the purposes of providing office and  
15 accommodations for the House of Representatives, the  
16 House Office Building Commission is authorized to enter  
17 into such agreements regarding the use of the building by  
18 the House or by other persons as the Commission con-  
19 siderers appropriate.

20 (b) EFFECTIVE DATE.—This section shall apply with  
21 respect to fiscal year 2014 and each succeeding fiscal year.

22 LIBRARY OF CONGRESS

23 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

24 For necessary expenses of the Library of Congress  
25 not otherwise provided for, including development and  
26 maintenance of the Library’s catalogs; custody and custo-

1 dial care of the Library buildings; special clothing; clean-  
2 ing, laundering and repair of uniforms; preservation of  
3 motion pictures in the custody of the Library; operation  
4 and maintenance of the American Folklife Center in the  
5 Library; activities under the Civil Rights History Project  
6 Act of 2009; preparation and distribution of catalog  
7 records and other publications of the Library; hire or pur-  
8 chase of one passenger motor vehicle; and expenses of the  
9 Library of Congress Trust Fund Board not properly  
10 chargeable to the income of any trust fund held by the  
11 Board, \$398,439,059, of which not more than \$6,000,000  
12 shall be derived from collections credited to this appropria-  
13 tion during fiscal year 2014, and shall remain available  
14 until expended, under the Act of June 28, 1902 (chapter  
15 1301; 32 Stat. 480; 2 U.S.C. 150) and not more than  
16 \$350,000 shall be derived from collections during fiscal  
17 year 2014 and shall remain available until expended for  
18 the development and maintenance of an international legal  
19 information database and activities related thereto: *Pro-*  
20 *vided*, That the Library of Congress may not obligate or  
21 expend any funds derived from collections under the Act  
22 of June 28, 1902, in excess of the amount authorized for  
23 obligation or expenditure in appropriations Acts: *Provided*  
24 *further*, That the total amount available for obligation  
25 shall be reduced by the amount by which collections are

1 less than \$6,350,000: *Provided further*, That of the total  
2 amount appropriated, not more than \$12,000 may be ex-  
3 pended, on the certification of the Librarian of Congress,  
4 in connection with official representation and reception ex-  
5 penses for the Overseas Field Offices: *Provided further*,  
6 That of the total amount appropriated, \$7,068,000 shall  
7 remain available until expended for the digital collections  
8 and educational curricula program.

9 COPYRIGTH OFFICE

10 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

11 For all necessary expenses of the Copyright Office,  
12 \$50,172,412, of which not more than \$28,029,000, to re-  
13 main available until expended, shall be derived from collec-  
14 tions credited to this appropriation during fiscal year 2013  
15 under section 708(d) of title 17, United States Code: *Pro-*  
16 *vided*, That the Copyright Office may not obligate or ex-  
17 pend any funds derived from collections under such sec-  
18 tion, in excess of the amount authorized for obligation or  
19 expenditure in appropriations Acts: *Provided further*, That  
20 not more than \$5,590,000 shall be derived from collections  
21 during fiscal year 2014 under sections 111(d)(2),  
22 119(b)(2), 803(e), 1005, and 1316 of such title: *Provided*  
23 *further*, That the total amount available for obligation  
24 shall be reduced by the amount by which collections are  
25 less than \$33,619,000: *Provided further*, That not more

1 than \$100,000 of the amount appropriated is available for  
2 the maintenance of an “International Copyright Institute”  
3 in the Copyright Office of the Library of Congress for the  
4 purpose of training nationals of developing countries in  
5 intellectual property laws and policies: *Provided further,*  
6 That not more than \$4,250 may be expended, on the cer-  
7 tification of the Librarian of Congress, in connection with  
8 official representation and reception expenses for activities  
9 of the International Copyright Institute and for copyright  
10 delegations, visitors, and seminars: *Provided further,* That  
11 notwithstanding any provision of chapter 8 of title 17,  
12 United States Code, any amounts made available under  
13 this heading which are attributable to royalty fees and  
14 payments received by the Copyright Office pursuant to  
15 sections 111, 119, and chapter 10 of such title may be  
16 used for the costs incurred in the administration of the  
17 Copyright Royalty Judges program, with the exception of  
18 the costs of salaries and benefits for the Copyright Royalty  
19 Judges and staff under section 802(e).

20 CONGRESSIONAL RESEARCH SERVICE

21 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

22 For necessary expenses to carry out the provisions  
23 of section 203 of the Legislative Reorganization Act of  
24 1946 (2 U.S.C. 166) and to revise and extend the Anno-  
25 tated Constitution of the United States of America,

1 \$101,204,242: *Provided*, That no part of such amount  
2 may be used to pay any salary or expense in connection  
3 with any publication, or preparation of material therefor  
4 (except the Digest of Public General Bills), to be issued  
5 by the Library of Congress unless such publication has  
6 obtained prior approval of either the Committee on House  
7 Administration of the House of Representatives or the  
8 Committee on Rules and Administration of the Senate.

9 BOOKS FOR THE BLIND AND PHYSICALLY HANDICAPPED  
10 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

11 For salaries and expenses to carry out the Act of  
12 March 3, 1931 (chapter 400; 46 Stat. 1487; 2 U.S.C.  
13 135a), \$48,023,446: *Provided*, That of the total amount  
14 appropriated, \$650,000 shall be available to contract to  
15 provide newspapers to blind and physically handicapped  
16 residents at no cost to the individual.

17 ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISIONS

18 REIMBURSABLE AND REVOLVING FUND ACTIVITIES

19 SEC. 1401. (a) IN GENERAL.—For fiscal year 2014,  
20 the obligational authority of the Library of Congress for  
21 the activities described in subsection (b) may not exceed  
22 \$178,958,000.

23 (b) ACTIVITIES.—The activities referred to in sub-  
24 section (a) are reimbursable and revolving fund activities  
25 that are funded from sources other than appropriations



1 to the Library in appropriations Acts for the legislative  
2 branch.

3           AUTHORITY TO TRANSFER AMOUNTS BETWEEN  
4                           CATEGORIES OF APPROPRIATIONS

5           SEC. 1402. (a) IN GENERAL.—During fiscal year  
6 2014 and any succeeding fiscal year, the Librarian of Con-  
7 gress may transfer amounts appropriated for the fiscal  
8 year between the categories of appropriations provided  
9 under law for the Library of Congress for the fiscal year,  
10 upon the approval of the Committees on Appropriations  
11 of the House of Representatives and Senate.

12           (b) LIMITATION.—Not more than 10 percent of the  
13 total amount of funds appropriated to the account under  
14 any category of appropriations for the Library of Congress  
15 for a fiscal year may be transferred from that account by  
16 all transfers made under subsection (a).

18                           CONGRESSIONAL PRINTING AND BINDING

19   (INCLUDING TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

20           For authorized printing and binding for the Congress  
21 and the distribution of Congressional information in any  
22 format; expenses necessary for preparing the semimonthly  
23 and session index to the Congressional Record, as author-  
24 ized by law (section 902 of title 44, United States Code);  
25 printing and binding of Government publications author-

1 ized by law to be distributed to Members of Congress; and  
2 printing, binding, and distribution of Government publica-  
3 tions authorized by law to be distributed without charge  
4 to the recipient, \$79,736,000: *Provided*, That this appro-  
5 priation shall not be available for paper copies of the per-  
6 manent edition of the Congressional Record for individual  
7 Representatives, Resident Commissioners or Delegates au-  
8 thorized under section 906 of title 44, United States Code:  
9 *Provided further*, That this appropriation shall be available  
10 for the payment of obligations incurred under the appro-  
11 priations for similar purposes for preceding fiscal years:  
12 *Provided further*, That notwithstanding the 2-year limita-  
13 tion under section 718 of title 44, United States Code,  
14 none of the funds appropriated or made available under  
15 this Act or any other Act for printing and binding and  
16 related services provided to Congress under chapter 7 of  
17 title 44, United States Code, may be expended to print  
18 a document, report, or publication after the 27-month pe-  
19 riod beginning on the date that such document, report,  
20 or publication is authorized by Congress to be printed, un-  
21 less Congress reauthorizes such printing in accordance  
22 with section 718 of title 44, United States Code: *Provided*  
23 *further*, That any unobligated or unexpended balances in  
24 this account or accounts for similar purposes for preceding  
25 fiscal years may be transferred to the Government Print-

1 ing Office revolving fund for carrying out the purposes of  
2 this heading, subject to the approval of the Committees  
3 on Appropriations of the House of Representatives and  
4 Senate: *Provided further*, That notwithstanding sections  
5 901, 902, and 906 of title 44, United States Code, this  
6 appropriation may be used to prepare indexes to the Con-  
7 gressional Record on only a monthly and session basis.

8 OFFICE OF SUPERINTENDENT OF DOCUMENTS  
9 SALARIES AND EXPENSES  
10 (INCLUDING TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

11 For expenses of the Office of Superintendent of Doc-  
12 uments necessary to provide for the cataloging and index-  
13 ing of Government publications and their distribution to  
14 the public, Members of Congress, other Government agen-  
15 cies, and designated depository and international exchange  
16 libraries as authorized by law, \$31,437,000: *Provided*,  
17 That amounts of not more than \$2,000,000 from current  
18 year appropriations are authorized for producing and dis-  
19 seminating Congressional serial sets and other related  
20 publications for fiscal years 2012 and 2013 to depository  
21 and other designated libraries: *Provided further*, That any  
22 unobligated or unexpended balances in this account or ac-  
23 counts for similar purposes for preceding fiscal years may  
24 be transferred to the Government Printing Office revolv-  
25 ing fund for carrying out the purposes of this heading,

1 subject to the approval of the Committees on Appropria-  
2 tions of the House of Representatives and Senate.

3 GOVERNMENT PRINTING OFFICE REVOLVING FUND

4 For payment to the Government Printing Office Re-  
5 volving Fund, \$3,966,847, to remain available until ex-  
6 pended, for information technology development and facili-  
7 ties repair: *Provided*, That the Government Printing Of-  
8 fice is hereby authorized to make such expenditures, with-  
9 in the limits of funds available and in accordance with law,  
10 and to make such contracts and commitments without re-  
11 gard to fiscal year limitations as provided by section 9104  
12 of title 31, United States Code, as may be necessary in  
13 carrying out the programs and purposes set forth in the  
14 budget for the current fiscal year for the Government  
15 Printing Office revolving fund: *Provided further*, That not  
16 more than \$7,500 may be expended on the certification  
17 of the Public Printer in connection with official represen-  
18 tation and reception expenses: *Provided further*, That the  
19 revolving fund shall be available for the hire or purchase  
20 of not more than 12 passenger motor vehicles: *Provided*  
21 *further*, That expenditures in connection with travel ex-  
22 penses of the advisory councils to the Public Printer shall  
23 be deemed necessary to carry out the provisions of title

25 ving fund shall be available for temporary or intermittent

13 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

14 For necessary expenses of the Government Account-  
15 ability Office, including not more than \$12,500 to be ex-  
16 pended on the certification of the Comptroller General of  
17 the United States in connection with official representa-  
18 tion and reception expenses; temporary or intermittent  
19 services under section 3109(b) of title 5, United States  
20 Code, but at rates for individuals not more than the daily  
21 equivalent of the annual rate of basic pay for level IV of  
22 the Executive Schedule under section 5315 of such title;  
23 hire of one passenger motor vehicle; advance payments in  
24 foreign countries in accordance with section 3324 of title  
25 31, United States Code; benefits comparable to those pay-

1 able under sections 901(5), (6), and (8) of the Foreign  
2 Service Act of 1980 (22 U.S.C. 4081(5), (6), and (8));  
3 and under regulations prescribed by the Comptroller Gen-  
4 eral of the United States, rental of living quarters in for-  
5 eign countries, \$486,226,129: *Provided*, That, in addition,  
6 \$32,368,000 of payments received under sections 782,  
7 3521, and 9105 of title 31, United States Code, shall be  
8 available without fiscal year limitation: *Provided further*,  
9 That this appropriation and appropriations for adminis-  
10 trative expenses of any other department or agency which  
11 is a member of the National Intergovernmental Audit  
12 Forum or a Regional Intergovernmental Audit Forum  
13 shall be available to finance an appropriate share of either  
14 Forum's costs as determined by the respective Forum, in-  
15 cluding necessary travel expenses of non-Federal partici-  
16 pants: *Provided further*, That payments hereunder to the

20 USE OF ELECTRONIC FILING FOR PROCUREMENT

21 PROTEST SYSTEM

22 SEC. 1501. Section 3555(c) of title 31, United States  
23 Code, is amended to read as follows:

24 “(c) ELECTRONIC FILING AND DOCUMENT DISSEMI-  
25 NATION SYSTEM.—

1           “(1) ESTABLISHMENT AND OPERATION OF SYS-  
2           TEM.—The Comptroller General shall establish and  
3           operate an electronic filing and document dissemina-  
4           tion system under which, in accordance with proce-  
5           dures prescribed by the Comptroller General—

6                   “(A) a person filing a protest under this  
7                   subchapter may file the protest through elec-  
8                   tronic means; and

9                   “(B) all documents and information re-  
10                  quired with respect to the protest may be dis-  
11                  seminated and made available to the parties to  
12                  the protest through electronic means.

13           “(2) IMPOSITION OF FEES.—

14                   “(A) IN GENERAL.—The Comptroller Gen-  
15                   eral may require each person who files a protest  
16                   under this subchapter to pay a fee to support  
17                   the establishment and operation of the elec-  
18                   tronic system under this subsection, without re-  
19                   gard to whether or not the person uses the sys-  
20                   tem with respect to the protest.

21                   “(B) AMOUNT.—The Comptroller General  
22                   shall establish (and from time to time shall up-  
23                   date) a schedule setting forth the amount of the  
24                   fee to be paid under subparagraph (A).

3 TITLE II

4 GENERAL PROVISIONS

5 MAINTENANCE AND CARE OF PRIVATE VEHICLES

6 SEC. 201. No part of the funds appropriated in this  
7 Act shall be used for the maintenance or care of private  
8 vehicles, except for emergency assistance and cleaning as  
9 may be provided under regulations relating to parking fa-  
10 cilities for the House of Representatives issued by the  
11 Committee on House Administration and for the Senate  
12 issued by the Committee on Rules and Administration.

13 FISCAL YEAR LIMITATION

14 SEC. 202. No part of the funds appropriated in this  
15 Act shall remain available for obligation beyond fiscal year  
16 2014 unless expressly so provided in this Act.

17 RATES OF COMPENSATION AND DESIGNATION

18 SEC. 203. Whenever in this Act any office or position  
19 not specifically established by the Legislative Pay Act of  
20 1929 (46 Stat. 32 et seq.) is appropriated for or the rate  
21 of compensation or designation of any office or position  
22 appropriated for is different from that specifically estab-  
23 lished by such Act, the rate of compensation and the des-  
24 ignation in this Act shall be the permanent law with re-  
25 spect thereto: *Provided*, That the provisions in this Act

1 for the various items of official expenses of Members, offi-  
2 cers, and committees of the Senate and House of Rep-  
3 resentatives, and clerk hire for Senators and Members of  
4 the House of Representatives shall be the permanent law  
5 with respect thereto.

6 CONSULTING SERVICES

7 SEC. 204. The expenditure of any appropriation  
8 under this Act for any consulting service through procure-  
9 ment contract, under section 3109 of title 5, United States  
10 Code, shall be limited to those contracts where such ex-  
11 penditures are a matter of public record and available for  
12 public inspection, except where otherwise provided under  
13 existing law, or under existing Executive order issued  
14 under existing law.

15 COSTS OF LBFMC

16 SEC. 205. Amounts available for administrative ex-  
17 penses of any legislative branch entity which participates  
18 in the Legislative Branch Financial Managers Council  
19 (LBFMC) established by charter on March 26, 1996, shall  
20 be available to finance an appropriate share of LBFMC  
21 costs as determined by the LBFMC, except that the total  
22 LBFMC costs to be shared among all participating legisla-  
23 tive branch entities (in such allocations among the entities  
24 as the entities may determine) may not exceed \$2,000.

## 1 LANDSCAPE MAINTENANCE

2 SEC. 206. The Architect of the Capitol, in consulta-  
3 tion with the District of Columbia, is authorized to main-  
4 tain and improve the landscape features, excluding streets,  
5 in the irregular shaped grassy areas bounded by Wash-  
6 ington Avenue, SW on the northeast, Second Street, SW,  
7 on the west, Square 582 on the south, and the beginning  
8 of the I-395 tunnel on the southeast.

## 9 LIMITATION ON TRANSFERS

10 SEC. 207. None of the funds made available in this  
11 Act may be transferred to any department, agency, or in-  
12 strumentality of the United States Government, except  
13 pursuant to a transfer made by, or transfer authority pro-  
14 vided in, this Act or any other appropriation Act.

## 15 GUIDED TOURS OF THE CAPITOL

16 SEC. 208. (a) Except as provided in subsection (b),  
17 none of the funds made available to the Architect of the  
18 Capitol in this Act may be used to eliminate or restrict  
19 guided tours of the United States Capitol which are led  
20 by employees and interns of offices of Members of Con-  
21 gress and other offices of the House of Representatives  
22 and Senate.

23 (b) At the direction of the Capitol Police Board, or  
24 at the direction of the Architect of the Capitol with the  
25 approval of the Capitol Police Board, guided tours of the

1 United States Capitol which are led by employees and in-  
2 terns described in subsection (a) may be suspended tempo-  
3 rarily or otherwise subject to restriction for security or re-  
4 lated reasons to the same extent as guided tours of the  
5 United States Capitol which are led by the Architect of  
6 the Capitol.

7 DELIVERY OF BILLS AND RESOLUTIONS

8 SEC. 209. None of the funds made available in this  
9 Act may be used to deliver a printed copy of a bill, joint  
10 resolution, or resolution to the office of a Member of the  
11 House of Representatives (including a Delegate or Resi-  
12 dent Commissioner to the Congress) unless the Member  
13 requests a copy.

14 DELIVERY OF CONGRESSIONAL RECORD

15 SEC. 210. None of the funds made available by this  
16 Act may be used to deliver a printed copy of any version  
17 of the Congressional Record to the office of a Member of  
18 the House of Representatives (including a Delegate or  
19 Resident Commissioner to the Congress).

20 LIMITATION ON AMOUNT AVAILABLE TO LEASE VEHICLES

21 SEC. 211. None of the funds made available in this  
22 Act may be used by the Chief Administrative Officer of  
23 the House of Representatives to make any payments from  
24 any Members' Representational Allowance for the leasing  
25 of a vehicle, excluding mobile district offices, in an aggre-



1 United States Code), the Chief of the United States  
2 Capitol Police (hereafter referred to as the  
3 “Chief”)—

4 (A) may issue a permit authorizing a per-  
5 son to engage in commercial activity in Union  
6 Square if the activity is similar to the types of

9 of Union Square to the Architect of the Capitol  
10 under section 1202 of the Legislative Branch

15 permit is issued to pay a fee to cover any costs  
16 incurred by the Architect of the Capitol as a re-  
17 sult of the issuance of the permit, if the fees  
18 are similar to the fees collected by the Director  
19 of the National Park Service for commercial ac-  
20 tivity permitted in Union Square prior to such  
21 transfer of jurisdiction and control.

22 (2) REGULATIONS.—The Chief shall carry out  
23 this section in accordance with such regulations as  
24 the Capitol Police Board may promulgate pursuant  
25 to the Board’s authority under section 14 of the Act

1 of July 31, 1946 (2 U.S.C. 1969), except that the  
2 Board shall promulgate the regulations in consulta-  
3 tion with the Committee on House Administration of  
4 the House of Representatives and the Committee on  
5 Rules and Administration of the Senate.

6 (c) CAPITOL TRUST ACCOUNT.—

7 (1) ESTABLISHMENT.—There is established in  
8 the Treasury of the United States an account for  
9 the Architect of the Capitol to be known as the  
10 “Capitol Trust Account”, consisting of all fees col-  
11 lected by the Chief under subsection (b)(2).

12 (2) TRANSFER.—Immediately upon receiving  
13 any fees collected under subsection (b)(2), the Chief  
14 shall transfer the fees to the Capitol Trust Account.

15 (3) USE OF FUNDS.—Amounts in the Capitol  
16 Trust Account shall be available without fiscal year  
17 limitation for such maintenance, improvements, and  
18 projects with respect to Union Square as the Archi-  
19 tect of the Capitol considers appropriate, subject to  
20 the approval of the Committees on Appropriations of  
21 the House of Representatives and Senate.

22 (d) EFFECTIVE DATE.—This section shall take effect  
23 on the date of the enactment of the Legislative Branch  
24 Appropriations Act, 2012 (Public Law 112-74).
